Dr. Jody K. Olsen was sworn in as the Director of the Peace Corps in March of 2018. Dr. Olsen began her career as a Peace Corps Volunteer, serving in Tunisia from 1966-1968. She has since served the agency in multiple leadership positions—as Acting Director in 2009; Deputy Director from 2002-2009; Chief of Staff from 1989-1992; Regional Director, North Africa, Near East, Asia, Pacific from 1981-1984; and Country Director in Togo from 1979-1981.

Prior to returning to the Peace Corps in 2018, Dr. Olsen served as Visiting Professor at the University of Maryland-Baltimore School of Social Work and Director of the University's Center for Global Education Initiatives. She also oversaw health research projects in Malawi while teaching courses on international social work, global social policy, and global women and children's health.

Resilience in Conflict

The world's most violent conflicts are being fought within its most youthful populations. In the five countries that suffered nearly 80 percent of recent deaths from violent extremism, half of all people were younger than 22. The youth in these countries are also some of their communities' most effective peacebuilders and best hopes for breaking cycles of violence. What does it take for these young leaders to overcome crisis, conflict, and displacement? Please join the U.S. Institute of Peace on December 12 for a streamed forum with thought leader and youth leader participants from USIP's Youth Leaders' Exchange with His Holiness the Dalai Lama as they share their expertise, discuss what it takes to build inner resilience and, crucially, examine how to strategically apply it to peacebuilding.

In the third year of the Exchange, USIP's Generation Change program brought 27 youth leaders from 12 countries to Dharamsala, India, where they enhanced their peacebuilding skills through trainings in conflict management, leadership, and prejudice awareness and reduction. They engaged His Holiness the Dalai Lama on issues ranging from cultivating inner peace, building bridges across social divides, human rights and the refugee crisis, and youth leadership. By the end of the program, the participants had learned from and inspired each other, and returned home ready to redouble their efforts to reduce violence in their communities.

This panel discussion took place at the Radio Free Asia studio in Dharamsala with participation of a live studio audience of youth leaders from around the world. The USIP Youth Leaders' Exchange with His Holiness the Dalai Lama is made possible in part by support from GHR Foundation, which shares USIP's belief in the critical importance of engaging youth as leaders. [Leadership in Global Health: Making 2019 the Year of the Woman](#)

With the Time's Up and Me Too movements, 2018 has been dubbed the "Year of the Woman" – at least in the United States. But what about in global health? Approximately 75 percent of the global health workforce are women, but women hold only 25 percent of leadership positions. This disparity exists despite women being disproportionately affected by malnutrition, HIV incidence, and mortality due to childbirth. It is impossible to think that global health targets, such as the Sustainable Development Goals, will be attained without significant leadership from women at all levels. Changes are needed to ensure that women are empowered through leadership positions to affect policy and action in support of these goals. The Global Health Policy Center has invested considerable effort in these issues over the last 10 years, including through the Women's and Family Health Task Force and the CSIS Commission on Strengthening America's Health Security.

On the heels of the Women Leaders in Global Health conference, which took place November 8-9 in London, the CSIS Global Health Policy Center invites you to a public event on December 12 to explore issues in advancing the role of women in global health policy setting and decision-making. In addition to highlighting outcomes of the conference, the panel discussion will bring together experts to delve into critical obstacles and possible solutions through a diverse set of perspectives. The panel also will look ahead to 2019, which will see a High-Level Meeting on Universal Health Coverage and replenishments of the major global health financing institutions, and try to answer the question of how to make 2019 the "Year of the Woman" in global health.

[Our Uncertain Nuclear Future: How do we Proceed if Treaties are Trashed?](#)

Donald Trump's announcement of intent to withdraw from the Intermediate-range Nuclear Forces Treaty constitutes another severe blow to a treaty-based system of nuclear arms and threat reduction. One last treaty governing formal, verifiable draw-downs of nuclear forces remains -- the New Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty. Mr. Trump has vacillated wildly in his comments on the future of U.S. strategic forces, ranging from an expressed interest in deep cuts to significant arms build-ups. For now, he has declined Vladimir Putin's offer of extending New START. Trump's national security adviser, John Bolton, might be expected to seek withdrawal from New START, and he might well succeed, rather than to leave the decision of its extension and further reductions to the winner of the next presidential election.

Our speakers will address the following questions: What role will norms play in our nuclear future? What role will treaties play, with specific reference to New START? The West is groping for a response to Russia's ongoing malfeasance, including its new attack on Ukraine in the Black Sea and its just-revealed effort to "muck around" in U.S. 2018 midterm elections. These are the latest in a long sequence of transgressions on the

part of the Kremlin, ranging from the invasion of Georgia, to the violation of Crimea and Eastern Ukraine, to interference in the democratic processes of NATO member states, perhaps most dramatically seen in Putin's assault on the 2016 U.S. presidential election. As a result, on both sides of the Atlantic, democratic values and institutions—and the transatlantic alliance predicated upon them—are at risk. On Dec. 12, Governance Studies at Brookings will co-host an event with the bipartisan Transatlantic Democracy Working Group (TDWG), featuring an expert panel that will discuss the threats emanating from Russia and elsewhere to security, democracy, and the transatlantic alliance—and what the alliance can and should do about it. After the panel, speakers will take audience questions. This event will be webcast live.

Her major publications include: *Framing the EU's Global Strategy*, Springer-Palgrave Macmillan, 2017 (author); *The EU, Promoting Regional Integration, and Conflict Resolution*, Springer-Palgrave Macmillan, 2017 (co-editor); *Turkey and the European Union*, Palgrave Macmillan, 2015 (co-author); *Multilateralism in the 21st Century*, Routledge, 2013 (co-editor), *Turkey's European Future: Behind the Scenes of America's Influence on EU-Turkey Relations*, New York University Press, 2011 (author); and *The EU and Conflict Resolution*, Routledge, 2007 (author).

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Building Peaceful, Just and Inclusive Societies Amid a World on Fire

Civil wars have been on the rise in recent years, causing immense suffering, from mass atrocities to famine, and historic numbers of displaced people. Violence is endemic in many urban centers, while the lives of large numbers of women and children are shaped by their experience of violence in situations of fragility. Through the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, all governments have committed to fostering peaceful, just and inclusive societies which are free from fear and violence. How can diverse communities working on prevention, peacebuilding, rights, and governance mobilize to implement this global framework for tackling violence and fragility?

As we approach the 70th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, violent conflicts cause unacceptable levels of civilian casualties, atrocities and abuses in fragile states. Disparities run deep and are intensified by conflict and violence. The most unequal societies are often the most violent. Weak institutions, rampant corruption, and high levels of exclusion fuel insecurity and damage communities and economies. More than half of the world's poorest people are projected to live in fragile states by 2030. Sustainable Development Goal 16.1 promises to "significantly reduce all forms of violence" everywhere, but lethal violence is expected to rise by 2030 according to current trends. This is not inevitable. We have compelling evidence to show that conflict and violence can be prevented through multisectoral action to resolve disputes, strengthen institutions, tackle exclusion, and invest in human potential.

At a time of global peril, join the Carnegie Mellon's Heinz College of Information Systems and Public Policy in Washington, New York University's Center on International Cooperation, and the U.S. Institute of Peace for a lively panel discussion on how to mobilize behind a roadmap that will put peace at the heart of the 2030 Agenda. The Challenges of Engaging Europe's Breakaway States

For decades, three “de facto states”—Abkhazia, Transnistria, and northern Cyprus—have endured in Europe. They are unrecognized internationally but are relatively stable



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and unlikely to collapse. The conflicts associated with them remain unresolved. Better engagement with these breakaway territories by international actors within a framework of nonrecognition should benefit all sides, yet it remains a big challenge.

Carnegie's Thomas de Waal will discuss his comprehensive report, [Uncertain Ground: Engaging With Europe's De Facto States and Breakaway Territories](#), putting forward new ideas for policymakers in these conflict regions. Rebecca Bryant, Natalia Mirimanova, and Tomáš Valášek will join De Waal in a conversation about Abkhazia, Transdnistria, and Cyprus; the EU's role in these territories; and what lessons their experience has for the still-developing conflict in eastern Ukraine.

The panel at the meeting will consider the types of harm that fall within the scope of proportionality assessments, what constitutes 'excessive' harm and measures that belligerents can take to give effect to the rule on proportionality.
