Project Nanhi Kali supports girl children from under privileged families to complete ten years of basic schooling with dignity and with safety. The TAG Report 2018 presents data from the TAG Survey on a number of aspects of the lives of teenage girls in India today. These include current schooling and health status, aspirations about education, livelihoods and marriage. At this panel discussion we will take a closer look at the key findings of the TAG Survey, exploring differences by geography and economic status and strive to understand what worked well in the case of



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positive indicators. The session will also focus on aspirations of adolescent girls and its link to female labour force participation.

The implications for the international security landscape of current political uncertainties and upheavals remain unclear. Arrangements for European and UK security cooperation post-Brexit have yet to be agreed, and the Trump administration continues to stress the need for greater burden sharing among NATO allies, highlighting the fault lines in current frameworks for multilateral security cooperation. Meanwhile, Russia and China are asserting their interests and influence in an increasingly volatile geopolitical landscape while technological developments are changing the nature of warfare and the capability requirements for effective deterrence.

What factors are driving these new patterns in diplomacy, and what do they mean for international security? What is the status of regional and global alignment over defense goals and norms, and what are the implications for future cooperation? What will the response be as powers attempt to reposition and restructure? What is now required for nations to effectively defend themselves? The annual Chatham House Security and Defense conference will discuss:
