Human Trafficking & Modern Slavery: The Roles of Finance & Tech

Join WIIS and the Embassy of the Principality of Liechtenstein, Washington DC on Tuesday, December 15, 2020 at 4 pm EST for a virtual policy roundtable discussion on efforts to combat human trafficking and modern slavery, with a focus on the roles of the financial and technology sectors.

Human trafficking and slavery are illegal in most states, yet the International Labour Organization (ILO) estimates that there are 40.3 million people enslaved or victim of trafficking. Trafficking is one of the most profitable criminal activities with profits of up to \$150 billion a year. In 2018, Liechtenstein launched the Finance Against Slavery Initiative (FAST) to examine how the financial sector can be mobilized to abolish modern slavery and trafficking. That same year a coalition of technology companies launched a Tech Against Trafficking (TAT) Initiative.

In this roundtable, we will examine what progress has been made on both initiatives. We will also examine how the COVID-19 pandemic has affected the illegal trade in humans, and innovative approaches and new policy initiatives to eliminate human trafficking and modern slavery. Pandemic

Nearly one year since the start of the pandemic, many developed countries have rolled out unprecedented stimulus packages to help mitigate the financial toll of the crisis. From contributing to salaries through various Covid-19 job retention programs to providing loans, tax relief, and cash grants to small businesses, many governments have pulled out all the stops to support their citizens and protect their economies. But unlike developed countries, African governments do not have financial reserves and liquidity readily available to keep their economies afloat and tackle the crisis. While facing substantial budget shortfalls due to the dramatic drop in commodity prices, market disruptions, the collapse of tourism—as well as falling remittances and flight of foreign capital—many are also struggling to navigate the growing debt crisis. They are facing difficult choices between fulfilling their legal obligations on upcoming debt repayments or using that money to tackle the impact of Covid-19.

What are some of the challenges and difficult choices facing African governments on a daily basis? While some steps have been taken by international creditors to support the world's poorest countries, progress remains slow. What more is needed, and what are the biggest challenges?

A balance between counterterrorism efforts and humanitarian action remains elusive. Agencies operating in areas with a sustained presence of designated groups feel vulnerable to criminal and civil liability, despite provisions seeking to exempt humanitarian assistance, which are often insufficient to ensure principled aid delivery.

The European Arms Trade is a Feminist Issue – and what we can do about it

Together, the EU's member-states are second only to the US in the volume of the arms they export. The production and export of military equipment are closely linked to what academics call the 'normalisation of a militarized approach to security' and the 'pro-defence industry' approach the EU Commission has been taking. At the same time, the EU continues to confirm its commitment to foster gender equality through its foreign policy - as for example outlined in the *Strategic Approach on Women, Peace and Security* in 2018.

However, delinking these issues fails to acknowledge that the international arms trade is a feminist issue. Indeed, an important opportunity to minimise the risk of European arms contributing to gender-based violence was missed in 2019, when the update of the EU Common Position did not amend the Position's language to explicitly bring it in line with the language of the Arms Trade Treaty, which – since 2014 – requires State Parties to not export any military equipment if there is the potential that they are being used "to commit or facilitate serious acts of gender-based violence or serious acts of violence against women and children".

The online discussion, organised by the Heinrich-Böll-Foundation and the Centre for Feminist Foreign Policy, will reflect on why the international arms trade is a feminist issue, debate the tensions between the EU's arms export and its commitment to gender equality and reflect on if and how the EU arms exports can be rendered more gender-sensitive.

Based on the success of previous editions, this year again the TEW will be organised in close cooperation with Saint Jerome Days taking place at Comenius University on 15 and 16 October 2020 (Saint Jerome Days are organised by the Slovak Association of Interpreters and Translators and bring speakers from the translation industry to discuss burning issues of translators' reality with graduate students and freelancers).

Diverse stakeholders in the audience will have an opportunity to learn and reflect on EU terminology and localisation of EU texts in the public domain, e.g. where and how it is created ('Brussels' or Slovakia?) and how media work with it in the rapid media environment. Last year's turnout at EU election in Slovakia (twice as high as at the previous elections but still the lowest across EU), serves as a proof of media's important role in building up the positive image of EU among Slovaks. The target audience of this one-day-event will be: journalists, media experts, freelancers, EU translators, academia, terminologists, linguists, translation students
